



“Two weeks before Memorial Day, I purchased 3 Homegrown Gourmet Sweet 100 tomato plants. I live in an area that doesn’t have any soil (I’m surrounded by blacktop), so I planted them in 5-gallon pails on Memorial Day. I bought 3 5-foot heavy duty tomato cages. I staked my tomatoes inside the cages and grounded the pails with bungy cords and 2 cinder blocks to keep them from blowing over. Exactly 65 days after planting, I picked my first tomatoes and they are the sweetest little tomatoes!”

“The buckets were filled halfway with pine bark mulch and the rest with potting soil and the occasional sprinkle of time-released fertilizer granules. They were watered every day even if it rained because they sit on blacktop and end up pretty baked in the direct sun all day.”

“As of September 13, I have picked 502 tomatoes and have at least 30 orange/red ones and more than 100 sizable green tomatoes still on the plants! The plants now measure 7 feet high! There are marble-sized tomatoes all the way to the top.”
